For 5 years, a little convenience store has been operating from the garden of 4 Kilham Rd, Rudston.

It sells confectionery, soft drinks, basic cupboard groceries and household goods. In this time, it has been a life saver for a small number of local people. The facility has now been developed to expand the premises and the range of stock on offer as well.

The store will be run as previously, through the cash honesty box, with progressive improvements to include more high tech facilities such as a card reader.

A new lighting system and security cameras have been installed and the area will be landscaped over time.

New lines of stock will include artisan bread from Higginson's of Bridlington, plus more groceries, cleaning products and toiletries.

We hope to offer an invaluable, convenient service to locals and visitors, adding to Rudston's assets at a time when many village services are being lost.

Bosville Arms update. We have the surveyor's report and our solicitor is progressing the sale. With the current timescale we should have completion end of April / early May.

The community share offer has raised an impressive £203,000.

Once we have completion, the plan is to invite all shareholders to an open pub so you can come along and visit the pub for a look around, and to discuss the planned re-furbishment.

Given the current problems around the country, Community pubs are playing a very important role, supplying take away food, operating as a drop off point for groceries and medication and using their supply network to ensure those who cannot travel have access to provisions. The Community pub model is especially resilient in these turbulent times and we look forward to the Bosville becoming the next one to re-open.

I wonder if anyone can remember being in isolation in the past.

When I was four, I contracted scarlet fever in the days before anti biotics. I was spared the isolation hospital because at the time I didn't have any siblings.

My bed was moved downstairs and the only person I could see was my mother who could only come in the room for a short while and had to wear a white coat. This was to last for 6 very long weeks.....we didn't have a television and of course no screens or computers...just a few books and toys. My friends were allowed to look at me through closed windows, which wasn't very entertaining. I remember a highlight was when I received a parcel through the post from my Auntie Joyce. It was a lovely sewing kit and I enjoyed playing with it, until boredom won over and I used the little scissors in the kit to cut off quite a lot of my hair .

My friends had come to hear about this and came to look through the window at this fascinating coiffeur, resembling scare-crow hair. I remember being quite upset about this ,but not because of the laughing and pointing, but because one of them had a new baby sister proudly displayed and I wanted one.

Eventually the isolation came to an end and I was alarmed to see an ambulance stop outside the house . They had come to fumigate the house and take away my toys; the offending sewing scissors having been removed weeks ago!

At the end of the 6 weeks, I toddled happily off to school only to find that my classmates had learnt how to do cherry sums; no extra help in those days, for those who had been away. This was a class of 50,without teaching assistants.

Cherry sums were simple additions, with pictures of cherries as a teaching aid. I learnt how to do them by myself and even better news....several months later, I too had a baby sister.


