



The next big thing on the church calendar is of course Lent and Easter. This year Easter comes quite early (Easter Day is the 5th of April and Ash Wednesday, the start of Lent, is on February 18th)

During the early years of the Church, new converts would be baptised at Easter and Lent was used for their final preparation. The period was marked by prayer, fasting and deep thought. The Church encourages us now to use Lent as a time for our spiritual development (a little bit like giving yourself a spiritual workout or spring clean even!)

I am a big Lent fan. It's a special time to slow down, take stock and change; perhaps just one small thing in our lives that helps us to both look after ourselves and love our neighbours better. What will you do this Lent?

There will be events through Lent to help us with the 'spiritual spring cleaning'. We kick off with a special Ash Wednesday service. It's name has roots in the traditional practice of using ashes made from the palm crosses from the previous year's Palm Sunday. The ash is placed on the heads of Christians at the 'ashing' service to the accompaniment of the words "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ".

It's not all penitential! We will have a weekly 'Lent lunch' to which all are welcome (Wednesday between 12noon and 1pm). Nice soup and bread, a short reflection and good company. So if you are interested keep an eye on the church notice board for venues or give me a call.

The Bomb That Fell On Rudston

I remember it quite well. I was living at Glebe Farm, Rudston at the time. If my memory serves me right, one bomb fell on the field across the road from the church on the right, belonging to Mr M Thompson.

It damaged the church windows on the east side, also the farm house where Mr and Mrs Thompson lived; so they had to move into Bridlington. The School house was also badly damaged where Mr North, the headmaster and his wife lived, they also had to move into Bridlington.

Mr Clive Wade tells me that the school was badly damaged which resulted in the children having two weeks holiday. Later they moved into the old Wesleyan chapel, which is now the village hall, to resume lessons.

The church organ was badly damaged. I remember having to play the piano for morning services, when invited....promoted from the choir. Five years later I was married at Rudston church and vividly remember Mrs Allison playing for my wedding on the piano, so it didn't look as if the organ had been repaired.

There was a terrible lot of fires around that night. Later on there was a ladies committee formed to raise funds to replace the windows and help repair the damage to the church. I was asked to be secretary and Lady Rachel MacDonald was chairlady. We raised £2000 which was no mean task in those days. I believe I am right in saying I may be the only person left of that committee.

Lissett Community Wind Farm Fund (Local Community Grants)

Lissett Airfield Wind Farm is owned and operated by Infinis one of the country's largest renewable energy producers. Since the wind farm opened in 2010 the company have made a donation of £60,000 each year into a fund which can be spent on projects that provide 'Public Benefit' in East Wolds and Coastal Ward of the East Riding. To date the fund has supported over 63 larger projects with grants totalling over £234,000. To date the parish of Rudston has benefited from the fund in the following ways:

The parish has received only 0.33% of the overall grant expenditure to date.

The fund is managed by a panel made up of representatives from the seven parishes in closets proximity to the wind farm. The fund panel will receive next donation from Infinis which is expected in January 2015 and have therefore met recently to decide on how the fund will be disbursed.

- 1) Applications are invited from local charities, community groups, schools, parish councils and churches in the East Wolds and Coastal Ward of the East Riding of Yorkshire.
- 2) The fund panel will consider funding request up to a maximum £5,000 and would like to see evidence of the organisation commitment to the project up to a value of 30% of the total project costs. In exceptional circumstances the fund panel will consider applications outside these parameters and will also consider donations of materials and/or volunteer labour as part of the match funding.

- 3) All applications must meet the fund criteria 'Public Benefit' which means that a project MUST meet one or more of the following and be open to all of the public. (Note organisations that have a membership within a specific age range can apply and need to show that all members of the public within that age range would be eligible to take part in the project if they wish).

The fund panel accepts that venues sizes, numbers of volunteers and other factors may limit the actual number of people taking part in an activity or event.

- advancement of education
- advancement of health or the saving of lives
- advancement of citizenship or community development
- advancement of the arts, culture, heritage or science
- advancement of amateur sport
- advancement of environmental protection or improvement
- Promotion of the efficiency of the police, fire and rescue services or ambulance service

- 4) Applicants must supply the following supporting documents with their application

- Copy of most recent bank statement(s) - all accounts
- Copy of most recent annual accounts
- Copy of governance document
- three comparable quotes from different suppliers for all items costing £500 or more

5) Previous applicants are most welcome to apply.

6) The opening date to download and/or request an application pack is Monday 5th January 2015 The closing date for return of Applications and Supporting Documents is Monday 5th March 2015

The fund panel will meet on 15th April 2015 to decide on which applications to support.

Please note that any expenditure on a project that comes from the fund must take place after the fund panel meeting on 15th April 2015.

Gardening Corner

Plant a Yew Tree



There is no better evergreen tree than the English Yew, *Taxus Baccata*, it is one of the only three truly indigenous evergreen trees, the Scot's Pine and the common Juniper. Yew is said to be our longest living native tree. The yew in the churchyard at Fortingale Scotland is said to be over a 1000 years old. I've seen it and I must say it looks it's age. Yew once grew extensively in the UK, doing well on chalk and limestone soils. There is an area, near Chichester, where yew grows wild.

To see old trees near Rudston, visit Boynton churchyard, which must be at least 400 years old and the arch of yews at Burton Agnes (pictured) are 300. A maze of yews was planted in the garden at Burton Agnes in 1990, their leaves are used for cancer research.

Stories of the wood being used for bows may be true, but certainly the tree is poisonous, so be sure to plant away from friends and neighbours where animals could reach the branches.


Container grown plants can be set out at any time of the year, but bare rooted plants April May or September are the best times. Old yews can stand hard pruning unlike many other conifers, as new shoots soon grow even low down on the trunks. There are lots of varieties and a few species of *Taxus*, gold ones, dwarf ones and some with different sized leaves. Topiary, the shaping into all kinds of weird shapes also uses the Yew. Old examples can be seen at Levens Hall Cumbria, foxes, peacocks are just two. The Irish Yew is the one that grows upright and needs wiring round when old in order to keep that particular shape.

So what about planting a few in Rudston , we have some of course in our churchyard.

Don't be keen to start on the vegetable plot, I know that years ago in sheltered borders, it was the practice to sow a few parsnips, hardy lettuce varieties and broad beans, but watch the weather. It is fine to start off tomatoes if a heated glasshouse is available. More next month.

Going without a whimper! The telephone box, that is. The parish council, a little reluctantly, decided to let B.T. remove it, which I expect they will be organising any time now. There was only one comment from the village of which I am aware, and even that came from a member who had been absent from the meeting. Once an essential item in any village, the mobile phone and instant communication have sadly made the public telephone redundant. Apparently no-one will miss it.

Our expected guest speaker was unable to attend the last meeting due to illness. The cost of the Lifeline scheme varies between £14 and £22 per month depending on individual circumstances with additional amounts for any of a whole range of “extras”. I still have a leaflet if anyone is interested.

Latest we had on the Kilham Road closure was that work would commence, weather permitting, on 26th January for 20 days. (That differs from their signs in place a few days later!) Any incomplete work to be undertaken week commencing 23rd February.

The separate article this month on Dog Fouling has been included at the county council's request, and though shortened, largely copies their wording.

Early in January “fly tipping” next to the recycling bins had to be reported once again. It looked like carrier bags of household rubbish, which makes it difficult to understand. Do you know anyone without a green bin? Or was it just that they had filled it to overflowing over the holidays. Though, we continue to suspect “outsiders” of course. The recycling area may be one of the less salubrious parts of the village but that sort of thing makes it look a lot worse.

An unchanged Precept was agreed at the last meeting. We have since been informed that it will actually mean a decrease in the parish council portion of your next council tax. Equivalent to 72p.on band D.

We also got the results of the last speed check on the main road. Over half the traffic recorded was found to be speeding – and that was above their criteria of 35 mph. The county council were therefore passing results on to the police for further speed enforcement measures to be considered. Nothing further has been heard to date, as to what form that might take.

The introduction of the “dial before you travel” bus service has not exactly been a resounding success, but Kilham Parish Council are hoping to get E.Y.M.S. to improve their current service through both (and other) villages. Rudston has given them its support.

As you may have noticed, Graham Stuart, M.P. was championing the idea of Defibrillators for every village. A parish council member is looking into the matter further before a decision is made for Rudston. Ironically, they have been installed in redundant phone boxes elsewhere. Oh, well!

Another parish council meeting should have taken place on 28th January before this is read, and the next will be scheduled for mid-March. Date next time.






Dog Fouling

Rudston Parish Council has entered into a “dog control partnership” with East Riding of Yorkshire Council. The aim of the partnership is to build close links between their dog wardens and ourselves, to provide a better service in responding to fouling and to deter it from happening in the first place.

As residents themselves, members of the parish council and particularly our own two wardens, will carry out joint patrols with the county council’s officers over the next few months. They will learn first-hand how to deal with problems and how to provide evidence to bring an offence under dog control orders.

It is recognised that the great majority of dog walkers do “pick up” after their dog and get as annoyed as the rest of us with the few who don’t. If you have any information on the irresponsible ones please contact either of the two parish council wardens: Mr. Robert Van der Heijden on 07712 129721, or e-mail: vanderheijden772@btinternet.com; or Mr. Christopher Shanks on 07943 517236. Alternatively, the county council’s dog wardens are available on: 01482 396301.

Dog faeces often contains toxocara canis, which though usually causes little problem, can occasionally result in damage to the retina of the eye. In children that can lead to blindness, and there are annually around 50 cases recorded. Dog lovers should therefore be aware that though it is common practice, it is unwise to allow your dog to lick your hands and face. Dog owners will probably be more aware of the other preventative measures: worm your dog, both as a puppy and as an adult; wash hands after dogs have been handled, and after playing on grassed areas where dogs are allowed; and naturally – clean up after your dog has fouled.

Bagged dog waste can be disposed of in litter bins, but it is a littering offence to leave it in (or hanging from) trees and bushes etc. That is punishable by way of £75 fixed penalty. A littering offence, or a full litter bin, can be reported to the county council’s “streetscene” team on: 01482 393939, or on-line at: www.eastriding.gov.uk.

There is also growing evidence from farmers of a link between dog faeces and two diseases in livestock, one in cattle and one in sheep. Dog walkers are therefore asked to be extra vigilant when exercising their dogs on grazing pastures. Both diseases can be picked up by dogs (including farm dogs) ingesting infected animal matter, so to minimise the risk please prevent your dog eating material from dead animals, or left-over birth materials. The risk to your dog is low, but it can sometimes seriously affect its health, or in extreme cases cause its death.

In short, PLEASE pick up after your dog!
