

Parish Clerk

Rudston and Burton Agnes Parish Councils.

The vacancy for a Parish Clerk for the above Parish Councils is still open. The job is mainly home based, and is currently estimated at requiring around 4 hours per week. The hours of work are flexible, with the only fixed requirement being to attend the (roughly) six weekly Parish Council meetings for Rudston (and less for Burton Agnes).

The ideal candidate will have administrative skills and be comfortable using the internet, email, Word and Excel.

Are you disabled and need to use a wheelchair in your home? Or perhaps you are caring for a disabled person? Did you know there are council tax reductions available?

Many people know that full council tax has to be paid for a property if two or more people live there and that people who live on their own can apply for a council tax discount.

What they may not know is that they might also be able to get a discount if someone living there qualifies for one of several types of other council tax reductions.

To qualify for a 'Carers' reduction, a person has to be providing care for at least 35 hours a week to someone who is over 18, is not their partner or their child (under 18) and who lives in the same house as them.

The person who they are caring for must be receiving at least one of the following benefits:

- Attendance Allowance
- the higher or middle rate of the care component of Disability Living Allowance
- a daily living component of the Personal Independence Payment
- an increase in the rate of his/her disablement pension

There is also a reduction available for people who have mental health problems if a registered medical practitioner confirms that they have a severe and permanent mental impairment and they are in receipt of one of a range of benefits including:

- Attendance Allowance
- a daily living component of Personal Independence Payment
- Employment Support Allowance
- a number of other allowances granted because of disability

Those who have reached pension age also qualify if they would otherwise have been entitled to one of these benefits.

A reduction is also available if someone (adult or child) who lives in the house is substantially and permanently disabled and **one** of the following conditions is met:

- There is an additional bathroom or kitchen which is needed by the disabled person because of their disability
- There is a room (other than a bathroom, kitchen or toilet) needed by and mainly used by the disabled person because of their disability
- A wheelchair is used indoors by the disabled person

This reduction results in the council tax bill being reduced to the amount payable for a property in the valuation band below the band currently applied to a property. Properties in the lowest valuation band, Band A, will still receive a reduction on their bill.

Information about the complete range of

council tax reductions and discounts, including council tax support (a discount for residents on low incomes), is available on East Riding of Yorkshire Council's website. Applications for reductions can also be made online.

Well, you may be stuck with me a little longer! A week after the new Clerk had been introduced at the May meeting we discovered that she will not be joining us after all. Whatever happens, I shall now prepare for the next parish council meeting as usual. That is confirmed as Wednesday, 29th June.

The dates between which the parish council accounts will be available to view are Monday, 6th June to Friday, 15th July. This will again be at the home of Mr. Neil Watson, as he was re-elected Chairman at the May meeting. (Mr. Warcup was re-elected Vice-chairman). Official notice will appear on the notice board nearer the date. If anyone does happen to be interested in the accounts we would just ask that you make advance appointment with Mr. Watson please. (Phone: 420848). They might also note that there will inevitably be a few days either side of 29th June when not all books are available.

The hope for a number from the village at the Annual Parish Meeting on 6th May went pretty much unheeded I'm afraid. There was a large police presence too! Not only the inspector, but both PCSOs were there, until he and one of the others were called away halfway through. However, the remaining one dealt confidently with issues raised. County councillors Jane Evison and Jonathan Owen also turned up as expected, and Peter Hirschfeld told us all about the Healthy Homes Project.

News of another "project" arose in the correspondence section at the parish council meeting, which I found later I must have been informed of previously. At least, a fading poster on the notice board pointed that way! For those who missed it therefore, it is a "Safe & Sound Grant" aimed at minimising fear of crime and providing home security to the over 60s and/or the disabled. This one is solely through East Riding of Yorkshire Council and the contact for anyone interested is Amy Dean on: 01482 396259, or e-mail:

amy.dean@eastriding.gov.uk. Also, most unusually these days, there is a postal address: Safe & Sound, Housing Assistance, DF33 Cross Street, County Hall, Beverley, HU17 9BA.

As you will be aware, library services are facing cuts nationwide. The County Council have now published proposals for the East Riding. Locally, one of the two Bridlington branches will close, and the mobile visit to Rudston will change to 4-weekly on a Wednesday instead of 2-weekly on Tuesdays. Precise timing of 11.20 to 11.50 a.m. is given. If anyone has particular views on all this, the consultation period lasts until 3rd August. You will find forms in libraries and various county council "centres". A questionnaire is available on-line at: www.eastriding.gov.uk/proposal-consultation.

There is a poster on the notice board about that, and there should be one shortly for "Superfast Broadband". This is East Riding Council's contribution to the national faster broadband initiative. You will be able to discover if it is available to your property on: broadband.eastriding.gov.uk. Their claim of over 24 mgbs. Speed has already been queried as not being achievable in all parts of Rudston for a start, but they would welcome comment or query from residents on the "contact us" bit of the website.

2nd Best Team in the Country!



Who would have thought back in September that the football team from Kilham Primary School would be playing in a National Final? However, after a build-up through several different levels of tournaments, from local schools to the Midland championships, that is exactly what happened at the weekend.

Two buses left Kilham at 7am for the journey to the Premiership Champions ground – the King Power Stadium. At 10.30am the team walked through the players tunnel and out onto the Leicester City pitch – what an awesome arena!



There were 2 tournaments being played, so the pitch was divided into 4 for the 7-a-side games. Kilham were on pitches C and D and began by playing the Northern Finalists: Barkston Ash Primary. It was a nervous start and the opposition seemed to be on top, but the Kilham boys worked hard. However, no goals were scored in a 0-0 draw and not a bad start.

About 60 supporters had made the journey with the team. They moved onto pitch C for the second match, which was closest to the West Stand where the supporters were. They were in great voice and certainly helped the boys to a 3-0 victory against Shernold Primary (South-East Champions) with goals from Jack, Daniel and a goal-mouth scramble from Eddie.

Between matches Tom was interviewed on camera by Danone, the organising sponsors. The boys had to keep taking on plenty of water as the day was very warm. Eddie took a game as goalkeeper due to Alistair feeling sick; struggling a little with heat.

In the final pool match, the boys were against Cannings who represented the South West. Another win this time 1-0, scored by Daniel. With a total of 7 points out of 9, a clean sheet and a goal difference of +4, they were runners-up of Pool B on goal difference.

With no break they were straight to the semi-final. Kilham wore their amber kit with the school name emblazoned on the front. Unfortunately despite holding possession well they were caught out and the opposition – the champions from Pool A – they slipped one past Alistair. However, the boys did not panic and were rewarded soon after with a goal from Jack. With 1-1 at the end of full time and feeling quite weary by this time they started extra time – still 1-1 at the turn around, but always looked like the threat of a goal, it eventually came from Ewan to give a 2-1 win and a place in the National Final!

So down to the last 2 teams – the FA cup final of U11 football! The other



finalists were Barkston Ash Primary, who Kilham had played in the first match of the day. Coaches Elaine Atkinson and Wayne Overfield just asked the boys to enjoy the game and this settled the nerves and very quickly they gained possession and had the best of the play. The opposition however were not lying down but goals eluded both sides, although at one point

the ball did go in the back of the Barkston net, but the referee had already blown to speak to boys from both sides who were jostling for position in the box. The free kick was taken again by Kilham but with a different result – no goal. There were some great saves from both keepers, but at the end of extra-time the teams had to move on to the lottery of penalties. Kilham took the first penalty, which was secured by Jack, then Riley with the second 2-2, however then things started to go a little tense as the goal keeper saved Kilham's next penalty. The tension continued as Alistair saved the next, still 2-2. It was the best of 5 and the nerves got the best of the takers and finally after 2 more misses the boys had to settle to being the second best team on England to Barkston Ash Primary in the cruellest of deciders 3-2.

Mrs Atkinson said, 'It has been an unbelievable dream, I have been watching this group of boys since they were in Year 2 – I knew they were something special. I cannot thank Wayne Overfield enough for supporting me with them in the build-up and on the day, his knowledge and footballing experience has been invaluable.'






An Obituary
