Crosslands Column

The meetings in the Village Hall on 8th May are causing confusion. The one at 7 p.m. to which everyone is invited is the Annual Parish Meeting. As commented in previous years this is the one which has rarely attracted much attention in Rudston. This year, with the added attraction of two East Riding of Yorkshire councillors, we hope will be different! The main content is the parish council chairman's Review of the Year, in which he will run through village highlights of the last 12 months in relation to the parish council. Anyone is then free to question or comment. That includes parish council members, who are simply "members of the public" for this one.

That is to be followed immediately by the Annual Parish Council Meeting. The only difference between that and an ordinary parish council meeting, is the need to elect (or re-elect) a chairman and vice-chairman, as those two posts are one year only. Consequently, although anyone who is interested would be welcome to stay for that, you would then only be allowed to speak by special invitation of the chairman, usually if you had particular knowledge of an item under discussion.

Anyway, come along on the 8th and we will see how it all works out!

The results of the Eastgate traffic survey will be printed elsewhere no doubt. The parish council, when it was made aware of the complaint, was doubtful of any real speeding problem there. That has been proved, with only two vehicles per day recorded at over 30 mph. over the week of the survey.

Though, how one of those managed 40 mph is beyond me. In this case literally, “there is always one”.

Further to the comment about notice boards last month, may I apologise in advance if anyone else’s notice gets covered up. We are legally obliged to display some notices, and apart from those connected with the above meetings, dates regarding parish council accounts are now to hand. “The books” are to be available to view at the home of the chairman (newly re-elected hopefully!) Mr. Neil Watson from 9th May to 6th June. (In practice, that will be more likely from 12th May).

Things are moving at the Bosville at long last. The licence application for long opening hours and live music rather alarmed some people, but it is expected that will be in order to cover occasional special events. The owners will let everyone know their intentions via the newsletter in due course no doubt, but the parish council supports the application.

No election has been called after notice of the parish council vacancy, so it will now be filled by co-option at the appropriate part of proceedings on 8th May. The member who stood down was Fiona Turner, but she assured the parish council of her continued support, for which it is grateful.

From the vicarage,

I write this in the week following Easter Sunday and things now seem a bit quiet. I know Rudston folk are interested in history and every Sunday has some history/significance to it; so what can we say about the one after Easter?

Years ago the Sunday after Easter Sunday was known as 'low Sunday', probably a reflection of this quiet feeling after the great festival of Easter. Easter in the past would have had an extra dimension and celebration than we are used to in that new converts to Christianity would have been baptised at Easter after a long and gruelling preparation. This gives us a clue to what's behind another name for this Sunday '*Dominica in albis depositis*' (Latin for something like; the Sunday of putting away the white robes). New converts would have worn white gowns for their baptism which would have been hung up and set aside in church on this Sunday. The white gown I wear for services is still called an alb. There is at least one other name for this Sunday: Quasimodo Sunday! The words quasi modo come from the line of a hymn that used to be sung on this Sunday at mass (*quasi modo geniti infantes....*) which takes its cue from the bible verses in 1 Peter 2:2, which reads, "Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation." Quasimodo rings a different bell for most of us and this was the Sunday on which an abandoned baby was found (and named after) on the steps of Notre Dame cathedral; known to us as the 'hunchback of Notre Dame' (fictional of course from Victor Hugo's book).

In the Church of England we now call 'low Sunday' simply the second Sunday of Easter: not quite got the same ring to it as *Quasimodo Sunday* has it!



Gardening Corner

Sowing and planting is at full speed this month, the tender plants such as marrows, pumpkins and ridge cucumbers must be well hardened off, as there is always the problem of a frost, but it's worth a risk. Some gardeners buy vegetable plants ready for planting out, leeks, onions and most of the large cabbage family, others like to grow their own. I sow main crop leeks now also a few swedes, although most growers would recommend leaving swedes until June or even at the week of the Driffield Show. Feeding tomatoes with a balanced liquid mix is vital to allow the full benefit of the light intensity, which means a clean glasshouse roof and sides.



My rhubarb patch gets less each year, it's 17 years since I started with a disease free, Timperley early variety, but these last few years roots have rotted off, even on new beds. A friend of my suggests it's due to virus, the usual answer, even to some of our own conditions!! Rhubarb likes an acid soil, so no more feeding with Nitro-Chalk fertiliser on our Rudston chalky soils.

All potato varieties should be planted by now, also French and runner bean seeds, I like to start the runners in 3" pots ready to put out in early June. Wallflower, Sweet Williams in fact most biennial flowers are sown now. Dahlia tubers planted with about 4" of soil on top. Sweet Pea plants can have their tips pinched out to encourage the flower buds.

There is plenty of work for the keen gardener, weeding, feeding and tying shoots, never a dull moment.

It was very much a surprise to hear that the Licence needed for the re-opening of The Bosville Arms Country Hotel in Rudston was declined. I am of the understanding that there were several objections made by some people living in the village, however, some have now been withdrawn, and hopefully, the licence will be granted at the hearing scheduled for 2nd May. How short sighted can some people be though - a lack of local amenities has a negative effect on property values. The Bosville may offer youngsters in the village an opportunity of employment, as it has done in the past.

From talking among friends and comments made on several Facebook pages, the greater majority of people support the new owners, and wish them every success.

There have been public houses in the village for years, serving the community, and the loss of the last one, the Bozz, as it is affectionately known, was felt by many locals, and ex-locals alike, such as myself, a resident in the village for 10 years. The Bozz was once a hive of activity, and only closed because of the landlord's failure to run what was once a successful business in an environment he was not totally comfortable with. Villagers met there each week to socialise and take part in playing Darts, Dominoes, and Pool. They went there with family and friends to enjoy a quiet drink and a natter, or to eat in the small but cosy restaurant area. Even the occasional wedding receptions and birthday parties were held there. There were regular entertainment events, including the very successful Rudstock in the two years it was held.

The new owners have spent thousands of pounds, and well over a year, turning the run-down Bozz into a modern, but traditional, family pub and restaurant, only to have its future jeopardised by a few ill informed objectors. I, one among many, will be keeping my fingers crossed for Andy and his family that they will soon be open for business, even though they were unable to open in time for one of the busiest weekends of the year; a fact that I am sure will have lost them several thousands of pounds in takings.




