Mrs. Allison's poetic memories of village shops in the last newsletter would bring back those of many people, and I have a few of my own from "both sides of the counter". However, I had already prepared the following about larger stores, which I hope will provide more memories.

Are You Being Served?

Having been given a voucher to spend, and realising I had a Saturday morning meeting in Hull coming up, there was the ideal opportunity to spend a little time in the city one afternoon earlier this year.

A new shirt was the choice. Yes, I usually purchase such things nearer home, in Driffield or Bridlington, but here was an excuse for a rare visit to the larger stores.

Unfortunately, such excursions soon have you reflecting on the "good old days". For a start, the stores are all the same! Some of the products might be different, but not the manner of display. You find yourself (unless it is "just me"?) wandering up and down the aisles, trying to focus on the thing you went in for. You have to identify styles and sizes yourself, of course. Then, just as you have picked something up, and are looking around for a till or "checkout", or whatever they call them, you notice a similar product on a neighbouring stand. You then spend another few minutes deciding whether to replace the item (now, where did I just get this from?) in favour of the new one or not. Eventually, having made your choice and found your pay-desk, you find there is a queue and everyone in front of you is paying with some sort of card, which can take ages.

So, to ponder. In days of old – well, 30 or 40 years ago – the store's department supervisor ("Captain Peacock") would have spotted me as soon as I entered Menswear. After a few moments, "Mr. Lucas" or "Mr. Humphries" (if he was "free"!), would appear discreetly at my elbow and enquire if they could be of assistance - "sir". (Whatever they thought of you, they were always polite). They would have quickly established what sort and price-range of shirt I was looking for, produced two or three examples, I would have chosen one, they would have asked if I needed a tie to go with it and probably sold me one,

taken my money, and I'd be outside again in half the time. "Thank you very much sir, please call again", and you felt as though they meant it.

Despite all the above though, I would still recommend visiting the high street over computer shopping.

At this point, we should add: "While it lasts", because a report from a retired Head of Retailing suggests that even high street stores are doomed. I have just returned from the Re-dedication and blessing of The North Face of the Church Clock in Church . It was an occasion to be remembered in the time of this village. 35 people , including some of the " Time Lords", came and Glyn Owen led a service first inside and then outside the Church (under Umbrellas) and then back inside. Dick Robinson played the organ for the hymns - Jerusalem and Christ the Lord is risen to-day and time related prayers and those of thanksgiving were said. Afterwards we all enjoyed tea and cakes. Chris Hobbs had masterminded a permanent commemorative board recording all the Time Lords alongside the minute of which they are custodians, which will re-place the large temporary board. Thanks to the cake bakers and all those who participated and again thanks to Paul Potts for his inspirational idea of a way to fund the repair of the North Face of the clock and to all who donated to bring this to fruition.

At present the clock has to be wound manually and it takes 2 men to wind it once a week in order to keep time ticking for everyone in Rudston. We would like to be able to fund the automatic winding of the clock but this has to be expertly converted at a cost of £6000. This is an enormous amount so I have applied for a grant towards the cost and await their reply and outcome in late July. However other fund raisers would be needed to achieve this. Does anyone have any good ideas ? Please let me know about them.

Our major fund raiser this year will be a Flower Festival on August 30th to September 2nd. There will be a Pre-View evening on Friday 30th August in Church -tickets at £11 each to include first drink and finger buffet supper. On Sunday evening there will be a Hymns of Praise Service and the Church will be open for public viewing on Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Please encourage you friends and relations to visit Rudston Church for this event. If anyone is willing to help please let June or Kathleen know 420600.

CHOCOLATE & COCONUT SQUARES

225g/8ozs dark chocolate digestive biscuits
75g/2 $\frac{3}{4}$ oz butter or margarine
170g/6ozs can evaporated milk
1 egg beaten tsp vanilla extract/flavouring
25g/1ozs caster sugar
50g/1 $\frac{3}{4}$ ozs self raising flour
125g/4 $\frac{1}{2}$ ozs desiccated coconut
50g/1 $\frac{3}{4}$ oz dark chocolate (optional)

Grease a shallow 20cm/8inch square cake tin and line the base. Crush the biscuits, in a polythene bag with a rolling pin or food processor. Melt the butter and stir in the crushed biscuits. Press the mixture into the cake tin. Beat the evaporated milk, egg, vanilla, and sugar until smooth. Stir in the flour and coconut, pour over the biscuit base and level the top.

Bake in a **preheated oven 190 degrees or Gas Mark 5 for 30 minutes** or until the coconut topping is firm and just golden. Leave to cool in the tin for 5 minutes, then cut into squares. Leave to cool completely in the tin

Carefully remove the squares from the tin and place them on a board. Melt the dark chocolate (if using) and drizzle it over the squares to decorate them. Leave the chocolate to set before serving.

Store the squares in an airtight tin or plastic storage box. They can be frozen, undecorated for up to 2 months. De-frost at room temperature

It has been decided that the Youth Club will not formally meet on a Tuesday throughout the summer holidays as many of the volunteers are away at different times. didn't see any mid-summer day dawn visitors hugging the Monolith like I have done in past years.

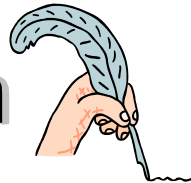

Crosslands Column



Anyone trying to follow government thinking on Wind Turbines could be forgiven for becoming a little confused. Do we need more or not? Just how are “local people going to have more control” over them? Parish councils will surely need more than the usual three weeks to consider plans. We await developments. (No pun intended). Meanwhile, the latest for Rudston to consider was another single turbine, which has produced another difference of parish council opinion but with a majority against (which of course reflects feelings in the village). This is for an additional turbine at Tuft Hill. It will be remembered that the previous plan for a single one was approved after appeal to the Inspectorate. As I write, this has just appeared in local press, and maybe surprisingly, R.A.F. Staxton reported to be among objectors. Also, that “20 neighbours” are in favour.

The Thornholme Wind Farm plans meanwhile are becoming something of a saga. The latest appeal to the Inspectorate is the subject of a Public Inquiry to be held at Bridlington Town Hall on 23rd July at 10 a.m. On the company’s behalf, Eversheds sent a separate letter with DVD disc explaining the latest amendments. I was unable to view the DVD (incompatible), but these are chiefly of an environmental nature. R.A.F. Staxton will be represented at the Inquiry, no doubt, along with other main objectors.

Out at sea meanwhile is the Dogger Bank scheme. Not much we can do about that, but as one of the nearer land communities, we are at least being kept aware of progress. (They are still talking!)

Another unusual planning application recently was from Northern Powergrid for overhead electricity lines on the road to Boynton. There was no comment from the parish council on what in the past we would probably not have even known about until they put them up!

Parish Council accounts were available to view for the statutory period, and have now been submitted to the Auditor. This year, as I may

have mentioned previously, that is to a London chartered accountant acting for the Audit Office. The chief change will be noticed in the event of them finding anything wrong. The way the figures are presented is different, and “penalty charges” will be made if things are not to their liking. So it’s “fingers crossed” even more than usual!

Apart from Wind (and not too much of that we hope!) there doesn’t at this stage look like being too much to discuss at the meeting later in June after this is prepared. Before the next newsletter, there should then have been another meeting, probably in mid-August. Notices will appear as usual, of course.

Happy holidays to anyone taking them!
