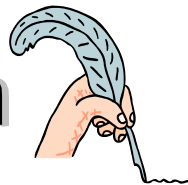

Crosslands Column



First of all, apologies to cycling enthusiasts if I appeared flippant about your sport last month. The details made available to the editor for the separate notice were obviously a little more comprehensive than the ones conveyed to me for the interest of the parish council.

However, there is more “road news” now. Notice has been received about road works in Rudston. The B1253 High Street is to be included in the county council’s Surface Dressing programme expected to commence on 7th May. This is “weather dependent” and exact details were unknown at the time of writing, but it could be scheduled to take place any time within a nine week period after that date. If anyone has any queries or concerns during or after (not before!) the work, there is a dedicated “customer care” telephone number: 0845 600166.

That has nothing to do with pot-holes, which are dealt with (or not!) separately by the county council. All, or most, of the ones in the vicinity have been reported even if they haven’t yet been repaired.

As many will know, another speed survey was undertaken on the main road before Christmas, after an approach by a resident. To put it briefly, the results show that not as much traffic as might have been thought actually “speeds” through the village. Though under the system they use that means those travelling over 35, not 30 mph. There will therefore be no further action for the time being. A point noted was that there was little “pedestrian traffic” crossing the road, which is something that would change when the Bosville eventually re-opens.

Parish council accounts for the year to 31st March have now been completed. The appropriate notice will be in place when this is read. For anyone interested, the books can be viewed by prior appointment at the home of Tony Ezard between 10th May and 7th June.

Those who signed up for the “Yorswitch” energy switching scheme will have received a letter from E.R.Y.C., and if you need further help (and if reading this in time) there will be opportunity to meet someone who knows on Thursday, 2nd May. A lady from Humber & Wolds Council Council will be available at the same time as the mobile Post Office. For those not yet registered, there is a “second round” currently under way up to 3rd June. The official plans for a wind turbine at the Haisthorpe water treatment works were duly received. It is fair to say that a definite point of view was difficult to convey to the county council. The parish council was almost equally split between “O.K. if you must” and “Not on your Nelly” really!

The next parish council meeting should be end of June – date next time.

Nature News



The first swallow of the year was seen on Eastgate on the morning of 15thApril, and was subsequently seen and reported on the same day independently, heralding the beginning of spring, followed on the next morning by another sighting in the village, this time of a house martin. More surprisingly a great white egret was spotted two days previously on the floodwaters by Eastfield and is the first record in our immediate area, although there have been a couple of records from earlier years of individuals in flight off the coast at Flamborough.

Other signs of spring have been the arrival of chiff-chaffs, singing their hearts out, and a small passage of goldcrests into our area, together with the reappearance of goldfinches and the song thrush. There has also been a sighting of woodcock, which is both resident and an immigrant locally and hares have been reported doing their spring antics of “boxing”.

Butterflies have suddenly appeared with reports of small tortoiseshell, peacock, brimstone and holly blue and there have been swarms of gnats rising and falling over ponds. Other insects reported have been bumble bees and there have been caddis flies and a great diving beetle in my moth trap at home. Moths have also shown themselves with overwintering species such as satellite and the rare grey shoulder knot being recorded along with chestnut. Several of the more common spring species have also emerged with engrailed being one of the more unusual. There has also been a report of a couple of bats flying during the daytime, presumably looking for a new breeding site and a fox has regularly patrolled Eastgate.

Spring flowers have also made an appearance with lesser celandines showing a carpet of yellow and speedwell with a similar carpet of blue together with coltsfoot and innumerable dandelions and daisies.

Now is the time when almost anything can be seen so please keep your eyes open.
